CoC Strategic Goals and Planning

- Lay the ground work ahead of time
- Educate leadership and grantees/applicants
- Use data to help decide where you should invest
- Look at total portfolio

Essentials for a good process

- Goal-oriented
- Informed
- 🗆 Fair
- Transparent
- Clear
- Evaluate and adjust
- Policies/Procedures to fall back on
- Plan ahead



The BoS scorecard has four goals.

- Fund organizations that have the capacity to run effective programs (can manage and administer the program, can operate on reimbursement basis, have experience serving this population or a similar one)
- Fund projects that reflect the Balance of State Continuum of Care & HUD's priorities: permanent housing and serving the chronically homeless and veterans
- Incentivize agencies to be good partners (participating in community efforts to end homelessness and HMIS, helping create infrastructure for their community's homeless service system to operate effectively throughout the year)
- Ensure that funded projects are being good stewards of BoS CoC funding and performing to BoS CoC standards



The NC BoS CoC uses two committees for scoring and project review.

- Informed, transparent, fair and clear
- Scorecard Committee
 - Revises scorecards to reflect updated priorities, address identified issues
- Project Review Committee
 - Unbiased
 - Applies scorecards to projects
 - Makes decisions on ranking, projects that do not meet project review standards



Scorecards are divided into two parts.

- Combined Scoring section
 - Scored by CoC staff + 1 member of Project Review Committee
 - Some subjective measures
 - Scores averaged
- Staff Scoring section
 - Objective measures
 - Some info by interview
 - Scored by NCCEH staff only



Project Review Committee Process

Orientation Meeting

Review of current scorecards and process

- Committee Members receive assigned projects to review
- One-on-one calls with staff

discussing individual scores and projects.

Final Meeting

- Review scores
- make decisions regarding ranking and inclusion of projects in application



Deciding what to score

- What evidence will we use?
- What connection does this have to our CoC goals?
- What relative importance does this have?
- □ How much is too much?
- What should be required vs. incentivized?
- What is the difference between poor participation and poor performance?



Scorecard structure

- Two scorecards: New and Renewal
- Points (awarded or deducted)
- Standards (met, not met, n/a)
- Scorecards are divided into sections
- Each section has a minimum that must be met
- Attempt to balance set process with flexibility
- Several questions pulled from scorecard in 2015 and put into Grantee Certification
