#### CONNECTICUT

- Small state: approximately 3.6 million people
- Child welfare is legal guardian for about 4000 children/youth
- Child welfare & Juvenile Justice are in same agency
- 2 COC's & 8 Coordinated Access Networks
- 2014/15 School year: 3192 students were identified as homeless

Partnership for Strong Communities Campaign to End Homelessness in Connecticut


#### **Steering Committee**

Broad coalition crossing boundaries and systems
Informs direction, advances policy changes, oversees work groups, makes connections.

40-50 people meet 4 times per year.

#### **Coordinating Committee**

Coordinates campaign, integrates strategies and provides guidance to work groups, supports and updates Steering Committee. 10-20 people meet monthly.



#### HOW WE GOT HERE

- 2013 Invisible No More Study: used findings to galvanize larger group of stakeholders within OD-CT as well as outside stakeholders
- Year long, multi-stakeholder initiative included

   state agency personnel, providers, advocates,
   and funders
- 3 subgroups considered
   stable housing, services and supports, anddata collection and integration

#### WHAT GUIDED US

- Encourage, facilitate and value the involvement of youth and young adults (YYA),
- Build on the USICH framework, and
- Develop, embrace and encourage best practices that cut across and integrate systems and traditional silos.

#### HOW WE'LL WIN

Two overarching strategies:

- ✓ Hire a statewide YYA housing services coordinator.
- Establish funding and transparency mechanism for all services targeting YYA with housing instability in the state.



Create better tools to identify, screen and refer youth in need.



Expand direct services and support along the housing continuum.



Provide or improve training and technical assistance for providers.



Improve collection and use of data.



Advocate for changes in policy.

- Data: Counting & Integrating
- Coordinating Access to Services
- Funding & Interagency Connections
- Technical Assistance

#### **Data: Counting & Integrating**

- First-ever youth count (Jan 2015); plan for biannual counts going forward
  - Resurrecting subgroup from planning process
  - Funding contributions from multiple state agencies
- Integrating data across systems
  - Partnering with state Office of Policy & Management (executive branch) to bring in data personnel from appropriate state agencies

#### Coordinating Access to Services

- Creating an information & referral mechanism
  - Newly created subgroup involving state agency personnel, Coordinated Access Network leads, workgroup members
  - Prevention & intervention
  - Connect to adult system with youth features
  - Youth Action Hub

#### **Funding**

- Homeless Youth Program in child welfare legislatively moving to Housing in 2017
- Housing capital funding round for non-timelimited supportive housing for YYA; to be coupled with funding from sister agencies
- Integrating YYA into already existing Interagency Agency funding structure

#### Technical Assistance

- Both at provider level (ie: TA re best practices with subgroups) and statewide level
- Funding from Education to address abysmal identification of homeless students in schools
- Tool-kits: includes videos depicting rights & webpage (youth-help.org) where can find resources

#### **Challenges**

- Funding
- Learning while doing
  - When to wait & when to move forward
- Cross-system education & engagement
  - Keeping everyone on the same path as we move forward
  - Keeping the right level of agency staff at the table
