Recap Core Components of Rapid Rehousing

- Housing Identification
 - Recruit Landlords
 - Address Barriers to landlord participation
 - Assist households to find housing
- Rent and Move in Assistance (Financial)
 - Provide financial assistance from move in to stabilization
 - Flexible
- Rapid Re-housing Case Management and Services
 - Consumer choice
 - Advocate and support
 - Connections to appropriate support and resources
 - Client directed and voluntary



Homefull Rapid Rehousing

- Rapid Re-housing for Families Demonstration Grant
 - One of 23 pilot programs
- Rapid Re-housing for singles and families
 - COC, ESG State, and Local



Dayton Ohio Homeless System Snapshot

- Strong COC
- Coordinated Entry with Front Door Assessment
- Centralized Waitlist managed by Montgomery County HS
- Significant reductions in TH programs
- Scored by assessors for RRH at the front door
- Diverse RRH population
- Both singles and families



RRH Population Snapshot 2015-Families

- 88 families
 - 87% female head of household
 - Average 3 children per household
 - 65% of all children under the age of 5 years old
 - 60% had no income
 - 1% had income from employment
 - 100% considered Extremely Low Income
 - Under \$20,000 annual income
 - Over 50% had reported recent episodes of Domestic Violence
 - 63% report Mental Illness
 - 30% report Chronic Alcohol and Drug Addiction



RRH Population Snapshot 2015-Singles

- 126 Single households
 - 58% men
 - 42% women
 - Average age between 45-54 years old
 - 100% Extremely Low Income
 - 46% reported Physical Disability
 - 42% reported Mental Illness
 - 33% reported Chronic Alcohol and Drug Addiction
 - 2% Veterans



Rapid Rehousing Benchmarks-Reminder!!

- 1. Reduce the length of time program participants spend homeless.
 - households served by the program should move into permanent housing in an average of 30 days or less.
- 2. Permanent housing success rates
 - 80 percent of households that exit a rapid re-housing program should exit to permanent housing.
- 3. Returns to Homelessness
 - 85 percent of households that exit a rapid re-housing program to permanent housing should not become homeless again within a year.



Rapid Rehousing Outcomes 2015

Families

- 33 days in shelter
- ✓ 100% positive exits
- √ 0% recidivism
- 100% increased their income
- 56% were employed at exit
- 7 months average length of time in RRH

Singles

- 68 days in shelter
- ✓87 % positive exits
- √ 12% recidivism
- 81% increased their income
- 52% were employed at exit
- 5 months average length of time in RRH

How did Homefull do it?



Rapid Rehousing Benchmark #1 Strategies

Reduce the length of time program participants spend homeless.

- Households served by the program should move into permanent housing in an average of 30 days or less.
- Housing First (everyone is housing ready!)
- Instill a sense of urgency, staff and clients (congrats you have been selected to be housed immediately!)
- Initiate housing process at first meeting (spend more time on housing and less on integrating into shelter/homelessness)
- Landlord partnerships streamline application process (common apps)
- Use groups to "go apartment hunting" (load up we are going apartment hunting)
- Technology (I-pads, Cloud based)
- "Pre-inspection" by case managers (get the landlord prepped for inspections)
- Background prescreening no surprises!



Rapid Rehousing Benchmark #2 Strategies

Permanent housing success rates

- * 80 percent of households that exit a rapid re-housing program should exit to permanent housing.
- Build expectations with clients from beginning
- Transition in place
- Homefull Solutions
 - Landscaping
 - Property Maintenance
 - Unit Turns
- AOD (Harm Reduction)
- Mental Health (Community Psychiatric Support Treatment)
- Community Support



Rapid Rehousing Benchmark #3 Strategies

Returns to Homelessness

- ❖85 percent of households that exit a rapid re-housing program to permanent housing should not become homeless again within a year.
- Flexible
- Non traditional (where you are at, literally and figuratively)
- Housing First
- Community Based
- Negotiation skills
- CTI (Critical Time Intervention) Non traditional community support
- Employment Services-Homefull Solutions
