COMMUNITY ASSESSMENT CYCLE



KEY ELEMENTS OF A GREAT PIT COUNT

- 1. Early Planning start in August
- 2. Encourage participation of the broader community
- 3. Integrate peer-participation in planning & outreach
- Develop customized strategies that reflect the diversity of your HUD homeless population
- 5. Supplement service-centric strategies
- 6. Think beyond HDX and the overall application in using PIT sourced data for education & planning
- 7. Use data from PIT to educate your community about homelessness & actionable community solutions

PROJECT MANAGEMENT OF THE PIT

August-October/2016

- > Recap previous PIT efforts in 2015 or 2016
- List areas for improvement identified from earlier counts
- Review new data or definition requirements from HUD
- Convene meeting of a core PIT Oversight Group & determine PIT goals and key stakeholders – August
- ➤ Identify stakeholders who need early contact (COE, jurisdictional contacts, public safety, public works, etc.)
- Plan a more general PIT planning meeting with Oversight members & broader community stakeholders - October
- Create a public website/access to post PIT updates and information

METHODS

- Choose a HUD approved PIT Count method
- > Review planned data collection instruments
- > Determine role of HMIS in the PIT Count
- ➤ Ensure HIC is accurate and updated for 2017
- Discuss potential duplication issues
- Review all key sub-population and review methods for special outreach:

Families	Children/ TAY	McKinney- Vento	Vehicle
Unsheltered	Encampments	Veterans	Ethnic Groups

PIT COUNT PLANNING

- 1. Identify & recruit key service provider partners
- 2. Determine a target goal and process for recruiting volunteers to participate in the Count and Survey
- Create and schedule volunteer training guidelines paper and/or on-line
- 4. Determine a target goal and process for recruiting peers and outreach workers to help in enumeration and surveying.
- 5. Create and schedule training modules for peer participation teams. Make sure to address oversight and support needs for peer inclusion (transportation, incentives for participation etc.)

PIT COUNT PLANNING....continued

Develop survey instrument:

- Ensure HUD questions are addressed
- Include key community questions (localism, camping, access, etc)
- > No more than 15 minute survey
- > Close ended questions
- Include de-duplication process
- Develop PIT routes and coverage plans
- Determine optimal time of day this is extremely important and can significantly change outcomes
- Determine the role of public safety personnel
- Develop quality control process:
 - All assigned areas are enumerated
 - > Paperwork is labeled, complete and legible
 - Assignments are logged and deployments confirmed
 - Quota, if used, are achieved to plan

YOUTH COUNTS - 2017 IS THE YEAR!

- Traditional methods for PIT counts are pretty terrible at engaging unsheltered youth
 - > Times
 - > Locations
 - > Age determination
- Many existing youth count efforts have been separate from traditional PIT counts

YOUTH COUNTS - LEADERSHIP AND ENGAGEMENT

- Make sure youth count efforts fit seamlessly into the general PIT count plan and method
 - Know in advance how you will analyze the data and deduplicate across efforts
- Bring together a diverse group of service providers, individuals connected to the community
- Engage them in the process early and often



YOUTH COUNTS – STREET BASED

- Create a giant list of service providers
 - Who do they refer to? Who do they receive referrals from?
- Bring together youth and service providers to talk about locations where homeless youth are known to congregate and map it
 - > Where are they?
 - > What time of day are they likely to be there?
 - Who are they connected to?
 - Are any subpopulations missing?
- > Develop ways to reach them
 - > Peer-to-Peer



YOUTH COUNTS - PROVIDER BASED

- Using your giant list of service providers think about how they can outreach to the youth they serve on the day of the count
 - Count and survey at each location
 - Refer their youth to other sites where they can be counted
 - Connect with people on their case loads and engage them in the process

YOUTH COUNTS - KEY TAKEAWAYS

- 1. Know that you can't count everyone, but you can improve the quality of your data every year
- Engaging non-traditional partners takes time so start really early
- 3. Think about how you can collect the data you want and the data you need don't try to collect everything
- 4. Keep the end game in mind but remember to stay nimble
- 5. Ensure service providers are compensated for their time and have enough time to plan for their absence during the count

6. Record lessons learned so that you can talk about the limitations and lessons learned

CLOSING

- > Get started now
- > PIT Counts are a tremendous opportunity for change
- > Recruit a diverse group of census and survey workers
- Use incentives to increase PIT participation, survey interviewers and respondent interest
- Recognize diversity and build flexibility into recruitment and data collection process
- > Protect the safety and comfort of those who are counted
- Circle back and make sure data from PIT is shared with the local community who helped collect it



The HIC and PIT Count

The Housing Inventory Count (HIC) is a report that informs the homeless assistance community on the capacity to house persons who are homeless at local and national levels

The Point-in-Time (PIT) Count provides the homeless assistance community with data needed to understand the number and characteristics of persons who are homeless at one point-in-time






PIT Count Overview

CoCs are responsible for planning and conducting, at least biennially, a PIT count of homeless persons within the geographic area that meets HUD's requirements

PIT count has 2 core components:


Sheltered



PIT Count Overview (cont.)

The count can either be conducted through:

- census methods (i.e., physically covering the entire CoC geography) or
- sampling methods (i.e., counting portions of a CoC and extrapolating to create an estimate for the remainder of the geography)



Changes in 2017: HIC

- 1. DEM project type removed
- 2. McKinney-Vento funding expanded to include different funding types (not merely yes or no)
- 3. Recognition of VA's GPD Transition in Place projects as an "Other Permanent Housing" (OPH) project type instead of "Transitional Housing" (TH)
- Clarification that youth dedicated beds should include beds dedicated to both unaccompanied and parenting youth
- 5. New field called "Housing Type" that combined the TH Unit Type field and the scattered site field from the address section of the HIC



Changes in 2017: PIT Count

- 1. Gender response categories expanded to include "Don't' identify as male, female, or transgender"
- 2. Reporting chronic homelessness by household type
- 3. Clarifying that when reporting on chronically homeless households all members of the household should be counted (even for households with multiple adults)

2017 will be used as the baseline year for tracking our progress towards ending youth homelessness





Using PIT Count Data

Collecting data is only valuable if the data is analyzed and used

HIC and PIT count data has several uses:

- Understanding where needs exist
- Forming a picture of the distribution of resources
- Tracking progress towards goals
- Highlight the need for resources
- Spotlight the impact of resources
- Solicit resources
- Public engagement


