

WHAT'S IMPORTANT IN THE NEW NOFO

Key Changes for 2022

- Access to the CoC Program has been expanded for Indian Tribes and Tribally Designated Housing entities, who are now invited to form CoCs and be designated as Collaborative Applicants.
- The NOFO will provide at least \$52 million for new rapid re-housing, supportive services, and other activities critical to assist survivors of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, or stalking.
- Approximately \$80 million is available for non-competitive Youth Homelessness Demonstration Program (YHDP) renewal and replacement expiring grants.
- Tier 1 is equal to 95% of a CoC's Annual Renewal Demand and Tier 2 is equal to the Difference between Tier 1 and the maximum amount of renewal, reallocation, and CoC Bonus amount.



Key Changes for 2022

- The CoC application continues prioritizing:
 - Promoting racial equity in homelessness and in the local CoC process;
 - Reducing unsheltered homelessness and reducing criminalization;
 - Inclusion in the local planning process of current and former homeless persons with lived experience; and
 - Partnerships with housing, health, and service agencies.
- HUD has reemphasized in CoC applications the inclusion of:
 - Improving system performance;
 - Placing an emphasis on anti-discrimination against LGBTQ+ individuals; and
 - Supporting local engagement to increase the affordable housing stock.

Steps to Prepare for the NOFO The Application

3 STEPS TO PREPARE FOR THE NOFO

1. Reflect

2. Review

3. Read Up

ASK YOURSELF:

"Is my system..."

- ending people's homelessness?
- advancing racial equity?
- targeting the highest needs?
- building effective partnerships?
- housing people quickly?

LOOK AT YOUR DATA.

Which projects have had the *greatest outcomes* in ending homelessness?

Determine if you are funding the *right* projects.

READ THE NOFO.

How can you align your practices with the goals in the NOFO?

Consider which new projects to solicit to make your system *more efficient*.

Be Strategic Reflect

Review the 2021 CoC Application and your score debrief

- 1. Make a list of activities that the CoC stated it would accomplish and collect data/information from stakeholders on progress towards stated goals.
- 2. Identify areas where you didn't achieve the maximum number of points in the 2021 application.
- 3. Prioritize and plan to address these areas
- Identify where projects can help you improve performance





Be Strategic - Reflect Principles to Follow

- 1. Be urgent and equitable.
- 2. Adhere to Housing First principles and practices.
- 3. Help people with the **highest needs**.
- Reduce the number of people experiencing literal homeless.
- 5. Reduce racial disproportionality and disparities.
- 6. Create solid partnerships between CoC's, PHA's, Housing Providers, Health Care Providers, including Mental Health Providers.
- 7. Collaborate with partners focused on the needs of older adults, Tribal entities, and the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs, among others to provide services.

Be Strategic Review

END GAMEHomelessness is rare, brief, and one-time

Using equity as the foundation, ensure that:

- People in a housing crisis have access to immediate help, including a safe place to go.
- People are not unsheltered.
- People do not spend long periods of time homeless.
- People exit homelessness quickly and do not quickly cycle back into homelessness.





Be Strategic Review

Improving Your System: Align Application and Funded Projects to:

- Reduce in-flow into homelessness
- Increase exits to permanent housing
- Decrease average length of homelessness
- Decrease returns to homelessness
- Address racial disparities and advance racial equity
- Reduce unsheltered homelessness
- Include people with lived expertise





Be Strategic Read the NOFO

- Ensure that your CoC clearly knows and understands the HUD priorities
- Use the priorities to determine what your community has, what is working, what is not working, and where you need to fill gaps.
- Focus on performance
 - Project performance should be reflected in systemic performance





Be Strategic Read the details

- Use the Detailed Instructions it will be difficult to receive the maximum points without following them
- 2. Make sure you respond to **ALL parts** of the questions
- 3. CoC's cannot submit the same project under both NOFO's unless prepared to execute BOTH projects if awarded.
- **4. HDX data will be used** to review the CoC application for performance.
 - 2022 PIT compared to the 2021 PIT count (or most recent unsheltered PIT count submitted) as recorded in HDX

Be Strategic Reflect

Reflect on what your system needs and the priorities!

- □ Update your Review and Ranking Tool (based on scoring and HUD priorities)
 - Don't just use checkboxes
- ■Notify local providers of priorities and changes
- ☐ Ensure that your request for proposals and all renewal projects are aligned not with HUD priorities **AND** with specific needs for your community.
- Don't automatically renew a project. Ask if the project is aligned with priorities **AND** look at outcomes.

REMEMBER -Just because its an eligible activity doesn't mean it's a priority for your community





Be Strategic Use Objective Criteria to Review & Rank Projects

Review renewal projects and consider Reallocation – objective criteria and performance

- ■Which projects underspent or not at capacity?
- ■Which projects don't meet performance benchmarks?
- ■What specific steps are projects taking to address racial disparity and including persons with lived experience?
- ■Which projects have significant impact on improving system measures?
- ■What are the costs per permanent housing exit for each project?





Be Strategic Read and Review New PH Projects



- •Be specific about what kind of PH project you need.
- Read each new project Carefully
- •Does at least one new permanent housing project (PSH or RRH) leverage (both) healthcare and housing resources that each equal 25% of the project to qualify for bonus points

Start with the End in Mind Ask...

...Does our System flow well?

"System Flow: An efficient, coordinated and equitable process that moves people from homelessness to housing as quickly as possible."



...What projects are impacting that flow, and what do we need to increase the flow?


Address Racial Disparities

- What specific steps are you taking to improve racial equity? What partnerships are you building to obtain input and include persons of different races and ethnicities?
- What does your Governance Board reflect? What new partners should you be bringing to the table?
- □ Are you rating and ranking based on the degree to which projects have identified ways to address racial inequities?



Partnering with people with lived experience


- ☐ How are you including people with lived experience across the continuum, including review and recommend revisions to local homeless policies?
- ☐ How are people with lived experience included in decision-making processes including the development of the local competition rating factors?
- □ Are you being purposeful in using the voices of people with lived experience that have been homeless within the last 7 years as well as those who are currently experiencing homelessness?



Be Strategic... Because that is how to end homelessness


This is not Business as Usual

2022 CoC Program NOFO release	MONDAY, AUGUST 1, 2022
e-snaps will be available	TUESDAY, AUGUST 16, 2022
All project applications are required to be submitted to	30 days prior to submission deadline
the CoC.	
The CoC is required to notify all project applicants who submitted their project applications to the CoC by the CoC-established deadline whether their project application(s) will be accepted and ranked on the CoC Priority Listing, rejected, or reduced by the CoC.	15 days prior to submission deadline
CoCs must post on their website (or a partner's website) all parts of the CoC Consolidated Application and notify community members and key stakeholders that the Consolidated Application is available.	On or before Wednesday, September 28, 2022 (2 days prior to submission deadline):
SUBMISSION DEADLINE	FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 30, 2022 AT 8:00 PM EDT



CoC Scoring (Comparing 2021 vs 2022 and Unsheltered/Rural Point Allocation)

Do's and Don'ts for the FY 2022 CoC Program Competition NOFO

DO	Start with the end in mind. Envision the programs you want funded, the system performance you want to achieve, and the resources you need to realize that vision.	DON'T	Dig into the application before you've had time to prepare.
DO	Reflect on your system and project performance before you get started. Identify the strongest and weakest points in your system, and consider what new or expanded projects would most benefit your system.	DON'T	Assume that what you're doing is working as well as it can.
DO	Review your data to determine which programs have the best outcomes.	DON'T	Plan to apply for funding if you're not sure how well your programs are performing.
DO	Read the NOFO to ensure you fully understand the changes for this year.	DON'T	Presume that things are the same as they were last year.
DO	Closely inspect HUD's priorities for this year's competition. Consider whether you need to reallocate funding from projects that don't align with them to new or expanded ones that are a better fit.	DON'T	Just renew your existing programs and expect that they're aligned with HUD's priorities.
DO	Consult the SYSTEM Series for blog posts, Webinars, resources, and guidance on crafting a competitive application.	DON'T	Panic. The Alliance is here to help!
