ALIGNING WITH HUD PRIORITIES & KEY CHANGES IN FY2023

MARCY THOMPSON

Alignment with HUD Priorities

- The CoC application continues prioritizing:
 - Promoting racial equity in homelessness and in the local CoC process;
 - Reducing unsheltered homelessness and reducing criminalization;
 - Inclusion in the local planning process of current and former individuals with lived experience of homelessness; and
 - Partnerships with housing, health, and service agencies.
- HUD has reemphasized in CoC applications the inclusion of:
 - Improving system performance;
 - Placing an emphasis on anti-discrimination against LGBTQ+ individuals; and
 - Supporting local engagement to increase the affordable housing stock.



What's Important in the FY2023 NOFO

Priority 1: End homelessness for all persons.

Priority 2: Use a Housing First approach.

Priority 3: Reduce unsheltered homelessness.

Priority 4: Improve system performance.

Priority 5: Partner with housing, health, and service agencies.

Priority 6: Promote racial equity and address racial disparities.

Priority 7: Improve assistance to LGBTQ+ individuals.

Priority 8: Engage persons with lived experience of homelessness.

Priority 9: Engage in efforts to increase affordable housing supply.





Key Changes for FY2023

- YHDP: \$147 million is available for Youth Homelessness Demonstration Program (YHDP) renewal or replacement of projects
 - Round 1: Competitive
 - Round 2: Non-competitive (but reviewed for compliance)
- DV Bonus: The NOFO provides no less than \$52 million for new rapid re-housing, supportive services, and other activities critical to assist survivors of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, stalking, or human trafficking.



Key Changes for FY2023

- Homeless Definition. Category 4 of the McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act definition was amended to:
 - Is experiencing trauma or a lack of safety related to, or fleeing or attempting to flee, domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, stalking or other dangerous, traumatic, or life-threatening conditions related to the violence against the individual or a family member in the individual's or family's current housing situation, including where the health and safety of children are jeopardized;
 - Has no other safe residence; and
 - Lacks the resources to obtain other safe permanent housing.



Key Changes for FY2023

- CoC Planning Increase. New maximum amount for CoC Planning Grant applications will be the greater of \$50,000 or 5% of the applicable Final Pro Rata Need (FPRN) so long as the total grant amount for CoC Planning is not > than \$1.5 million.
- **NEW Eligible Activities**. The following new budget line items can be included into projects this year:
 - VAWA facilitating and coordinating activities to ensure compliance with emergency transfer plan requirements and monitoring compliance with confidentiality protections
 - Rural activities that address barriers to transitioning families in rural areas to permanent housing and additional activities to increase capacity



HUD Funding Process

- Tier 1: Equal to 93% of a CoC's Annual Renewal Demand minus the Annual Renewal Amounts of YHDP renewal and replacement projects initially awarded in YHDP Round 2 or later
- Tier 2: Equal to the difference between Tier 1 and the maximum amount of renewal, reallocation, Round 1 YHDP renewal/replacement funding, and CoC Bonus funds that a CoC can apply for. It does not include YHDP renewal/replacement projects initially awarded funding in Round 2 or later.

Steps to Prepare for the NOFO

REFLECT



ASK YOURSELF:

"Is our system..."

- ending homelessness?- including people with lived experience?
 - advancing racial equity?
 - targeting the highest needs?
 - building effective partnerships?
 - housing people quickly?

REVIEW



LOOK AT YOUR DATA.

Which projects have had the *greatest* outcomes in ending homelessness?

Determine if you are funding the *right* projects.

Don't be afraid to reallocate underperforming projects.

READ UP



READ THE NOFO.

How can you align your practices with the goals in the NOFO?

Consider which new projects to solicit to make your system more efficient.



Be Strategic Reflect

Review the 2022 CoC Application and your score debrief

- Make a list of activities that the CoC stated it would accomplish and collect data/information from stakeholders on progress towards stated goals.
- 2. Identify areas where you didn't achieve the maximum number of points in the 2022 application.
- 3. Prioritize and plan to address these areas.
- 4. Identify what projects can help you improve performance.





Be Strategic Reflect – How Is Your Community Doing?

- Embed people with current and recent lived experience of homelessness into all aspects of your work (before, during and after the NOFO)
- 2. Be **urgent** but not at the expense of being **equitable**.
- 3. Adhere to Housing First principles and practices.
- 4. Help people with the highest needs.
- 5. Reduce the number of people experiencing literal homeless.
- 6. Reduce racial disproportionality and disparities.
- 7. Create working partnerships between CoC's, PHA's, Housing Providers, Health Care Providers, including Mental Health Providers.
- 8. Collaborate with partners focused on the needs of older adults, Tribal entities, and the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs, among others to provide services.



Be Strategic Review – What does your data tell you?

MILESTONE Homelessness is rare, brief, and one-time

Using lived expertise and equity as the foundation, ensure that:

- People in a housing crisis have access to immediate help, including a safe place to go.
- People are not unsheltered.
- People do not spend long periods of time homeless.
- People exit homelessness quickly and do not quickly cycle back into homelessness.





Be Strategic

Review: What does your data tell you?

Improving Your System: Align Application and Funded Projects to:

- Include people with lived expertise
- Address racial disparities
- Reduce in-flow into homelessness
- Increase exits to permanent housing
- Decrease average length of homelessness
- Decrease returns to homelessness
- Reduce homelessness
- Increase income for program participants
 - Connect people experiencing homelessness to mainstream resources and benefits



Be Strategic Read (and understand) the NOFO

- Ensure that your CoC clearly knows and understands the HUD priorities.
- Use the priorities to determine what your community has, what is working, what is not working, and where you need to fill gaps.
- Focus on system and project performance
 - •Project performance should be reflected in systemic performance.
- Provide local ongoing training and technical assistance for projects.
- Talk about reallocation early on and continuously.



Be Strategic Read the details

- Use the Detailed Instructions it will be difficult to receive the maximum points without following them
 - CoCs receiving YHDP funding need to pay close attention to the renewal and replacement instructions
- Make sure you respond to ALL parts of the questions
- HDX data will be used to review the CoC application for performance.
 - FY23 HDX Competition Report contains HIC, PIT, and system performance data



STRATEGIC CONSIDERATIONS TO END HOMELESSNESS

What Projects Will You Include?



Start with the End in Mind Ask...

...Does our System flow well?

"System Flow: An efficient, coordinated and equitable process that moves people from homelessness to housing as quickly as possible."



...What projects are impacting that flow, and what do we need to increase the flow?



Be Strategic Reflect

Reflect on what your system needs to meet the needs of people experiencing homelessness and the priorities!

- Update your Review and Ranking Tool (based on scoring and HUD priorities)
 - o Do not just use checkboxes
 - Be SURE that projects are partnering with people with lived expertise, are addressing racial inequities, and practice is imbedded in housing firs principles
- Notify local providers of priorities and changes
- Ensure that your request for proposals and all renewal projects are aligned with HUD priorities AND with specific needs for your community.
- Don't automatically renew a project. Ask if the project is aligned with priorities AND look at outcomes.

REMEMBER -Just because it's an eligible activity doesn't mean it's a priority for your community



Be Strategic Use Objective Criteria to Review & Rank Projects

Review renewal projects and consider reallocation – objective criteria and performance

- Which projects underspent or not at capacity?
- •Which projects don't meet performance benchmarks?
- •What actionable steps are projects taking to address racial disparities and including persons with lived experience?
- •Which projects have significant impact on improving system measures?
- •What are the costs per permanent housing exit for each project?



BE STRATEGIC

Some more advice....



Partnering with people with lived experience ASK...

- □How are you including people with lived experience across the continuum, including review and recommend revisions to local homeless policies?
- ☐ How are people with lived experience included in decision-making processes including the development of the local competition rating factors and project ranking?
- □ Are you being purposeful in using the voices of people with lived experience that have been homeless within the last 7 years as well as those who are currently experiencing homelessness?



Address Racial Disparities Ask...


- What specific steps are you taking to promote racial equity, both inflow and outcomes? What partnerships are you building to obtain input and include persons of different races and ethnicities?
- Does your Governance Board reflect people experiencing homelessness? What new partners should you be bringing to the table?
- Are you rating and ranking based on the degree to which projects have identified ways to address racial disparities?



Be Strategic... Because that is how to end homelessness

This is not Business as Usual

- •Don't do it because you will score better on the NOFO (that's the icing on the cake)...
- •Do it because it matters and it's the right thing to do (you need the right ingredients to make your cake before you add the icing)!!!!

Do's and Don'ts for the FY 2023 CoC Program Competition NOFO

DO	Start with the end in mind. Envision the programs you want funded, the system performance you want to achieve, and the resources you need to realize that vision.	DON'T	Dig into the application before you've had time to prepare.
DO	Reflect on your system and project performance before you get started. Identify the strongest and weakest points in your system, and consider what new or expanded projects would most benefit your system.	DON'T	Assume that what you're doing is working as well as it can.
DO	Review your data to determine which programs have the best outcomes.	DON'T	Plan to apply for funding if you're not sure how well your programs are performing.
DO	Read the NOFO to ensure you fully understand the changes for this year.	DON'T	Presume that things are the same as they were last year.
DO	Closely inspect HUD's priorities for this year's competition. Consider whether you need to reallocate funding from projects that don't align with them to new or expanded ones that are a better fit.	DON'T	Just renew your existing programs and expect that they're aligned with HUD's priorities.
DO	Consult the SYSTEM Series for blog posts, Webinars, resources and guidance on crafting a competitive application	DON'T	Panic. The Alliance is here to help!
